
Scarlette Jasper

Steering Column

Easter will be here any day now.

I just finished watching the drama miniseries "Masters of the Air" about the 100th Bomber Group that flew B-17 bombers over Europe during WWII. It easily earns an MA rating for language, gore violence etc. Even for war movie buffs, it is not for the faint heart or queasy stomach. (I can recommend the shorter, less graphic, documentary "The Bloody Hundredth")

Throughout the series, there are moments when characters, based on real airmen, were certain of only one thing, they were going to die. Whether it was by streaming bullets, bitter cold, fiery explosion, deadly crash, failed parachute, horrific wounds, or capture, imprisonment and execution by the enemy, death was the most likely outcome. Of the original 140 flying officers that arrived in England in 1943 only three could still fly combat missions four months later. They knew when they left home they were "going overseas to die,"

One of the surviving replacement pilots, "Rosie" Rosenberg, had the option of going home after completing 25 missions, he refused, saying "I can't go home, not until the job is done"

So what does that have to do with Easter?

Jesus knew how his earthly ministry would conclude before he turned the first cup of water into wine.

Jesus knew the crowds that followed and cheered him on would shout "crucify him" at the end.

Jesus knew the disciples who walked with him 24/7 for three years would desert him the night of his arrest.

Jesus knew there would be no last minute reprieve by Herod or Pilate.

But Jesus did what he came to do anyway. So that All who trust in him and his way will not come to a bad end, but will have the life of the world to come that never fades away, full of beauty and harmony. Jn 3:16 FNV

The good news of the Gospel is that Jesus didn't just die for us. He lives. He defeated death as the boogeyman that frightens us from living the life that God intends.

We can all be certain that we are going to die.

Because of Jesus we can be certain of an entirely different kind of living.

Easter will be here any day now.

What kind of life will you be living?

Family Matters

In our women's Lenten study last week the question was asked, "When have you felt truly loved and cherished, what was the occasion, and what made you feel that way?"

Some folks said they felt such love when a child randomly hugged them. Another person said that they felt loved unconditionally by their dog. Still another said that they felt loved by someone who remembered them when they were going through a very difficult time.

Interestingly no one said they felt truly cherished by their spouse in a romantic way. It wasn't because they don't think their significant other loves them, but feeling cherished is something that feels completely separate from romantic love.

Kate Bowler (author of the Lenten study we're doing) said, "If we forget what it feels like to be loved, we may not remember how to be loved by God, too." What would make us forget that we are loved and cherished by God? Life has a way of making us forget that NO MATTER WHAT we do, what we say, or what we think, God never stops loving us. We do something wrong and it FEELS like God is far away and is ashamed of us.

We feel guilty and then we pile shame on ourselves and carry the guilt and shame around until it weighs us down. If we carry those burdens around too long we forget God still loves us. We listen to the voice of the evil one who tells us that we've gone too far, done too much, and we begin to believe that can't be redeemed. During those times in our lives, we have to stop and remember what we know to be true. We have to repeat truth to ourselves so much that we eventually begin to believe it.

The truth of God's love can be found throughout Scripture, but here's one verse you can cling to: "I have loved you with an everlasting love; I have drawn you with unfailing kindness." Jeremiah 31:3. God's love and kindness NEVER fail and we can never do, or anyone else can do, that will separate us from His love. (Romans 8:31-39).

I have to tell myself REMEMBER WHAT YOU KNOW TO BE TRUE quite often! It's my mantra when I'm down and when I'm worried. God loves me. God loves you. That will never change!
